Introduction

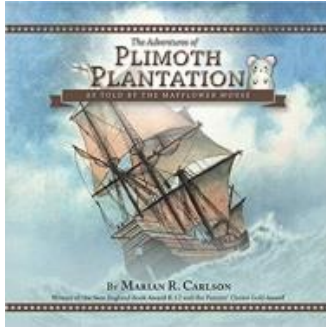

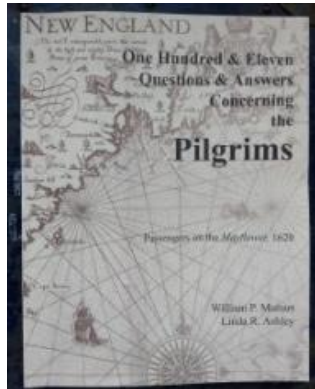
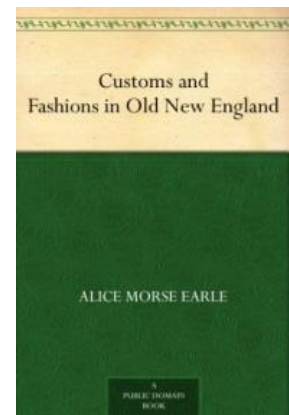
Having published a unit study in 2020 called *The Mayflower at Cape Cod*, I will share my favorite resources mainly from my research, as well as educational materials I've created.

BOOKS



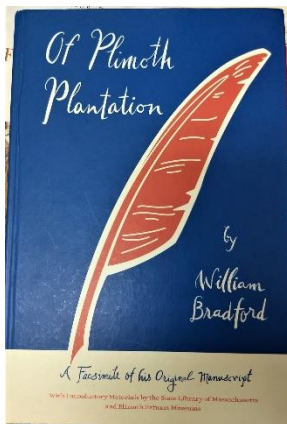
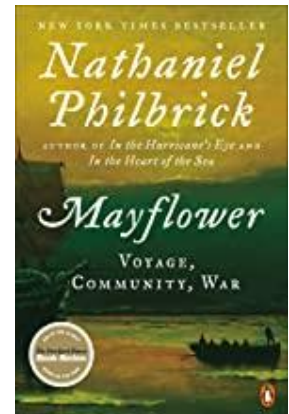
The Adventures of Plimoth Plantation as Told by the Mayflower Mouse by Marian Carlson. (iUniverse 2020)
For elementary.

Includes information from diaries and wills about the early Puritans in Massachusetts, their speech patterns, and how they lived. This book is in the public domain and is free on the web.



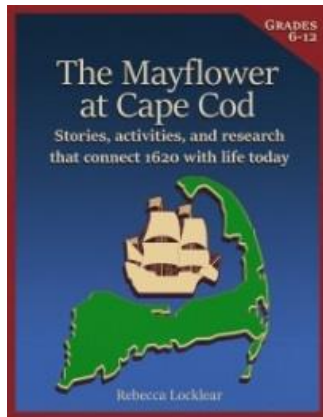
One Hundred & Eleven Questions & Answers Concerning the Pilgrims by Mattart and Ashley. (Mayflower Books 2009)
This is the basic book for all things Mayflower! Easy to read. Grades 6-12, Adults.

The Mayflower journey is brought to life in a compelling, story-telling way.



Of Plimoth Plantation by William Bradford.
One of the Pilgrim leaders, this is Bradford's personal journal of the Mayflower voyage and the first permanent settlement of Europeans in new England.

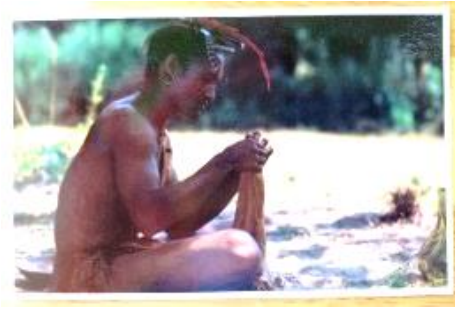
This website and lecture includes the up-to-date research for Mayflower 400: 1620-2020. Enlightening.



VIDEOS

1) Baird, Jessie Little Dove. **“As Nutayunean We Still Live Here,”** bullfrogfilms, 2010.

This is a documentary on the rebirth of the Wampanoag language. (The last fluent speaker died over a hundred years ago.) Learn of the plague that killed Natives just before the Pilgrims arrived in 1620 and later how the Natives learned to write so to petition the government. Find out why Natives feel Christians took away their family, language, and culture so their communities would die.



2) “Virtual Voyages: Leyden.” The video is available at www.mayflower400uk.org. Go to the tab *Stories of the Mayflower*, find *My Mayflower and Virtual Voyages*, then hit “Virtual Voyages: Leiden.”

This virtual walking tour of Leiden, Holland was aired in May, 2020. Leiden is where the Pilgrims lived before sailing to the New World. Great information on the Pilgrims and even a different take on the first Thanksgiving.

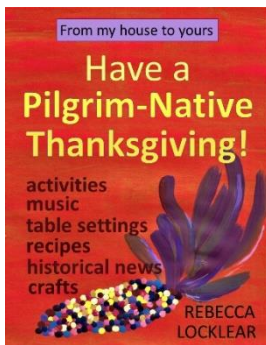
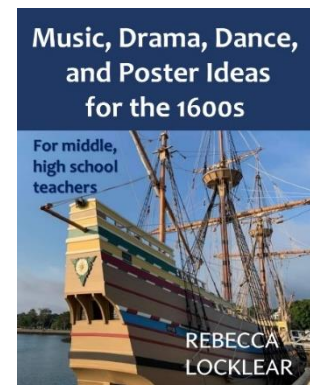

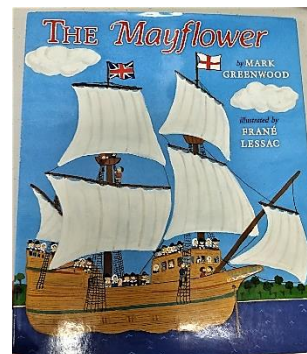

The Mayflower by Mark Greenwood. (Holiday House 2014)

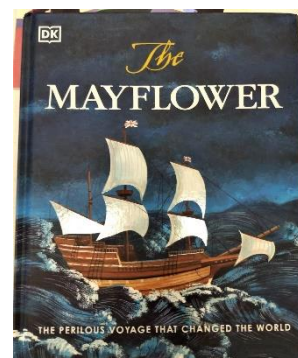

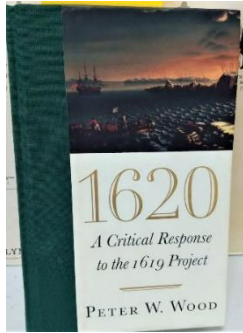

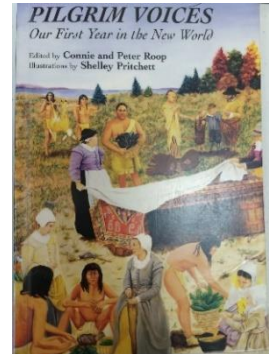

There are wonderful websites to find resources for Thanksgiving lessons or family time.

1) www.scholastic.com (not the store but the home site) is loaded with wonderful videos, slideshows, and printouts from Plimoth Patuxet Museums. Just go to this site and hit the “teachers” bar. Then hit “resources and tools” and it will give you the option to watch the “Mayflower” – a virtual field trip. Under Virtual Field Trips you will find four films:

The Mayflower – 20 minutes
Pilgrim Village –18 minutes

Wampanoag Homesite – 17 minutes
Plimoth Plantation – 30 minutes

You will also see the option of looking at a slideshow of sights at Plimoth Patuxet Museums.

At this extended site, www.scholastic.com/scholastic_thanksgiving/letters/asp you will find three “letters” written by Pilgrim children and Wampanoag children. On a sidebar you will find “Readers Theatre” ideas: interviews with John Alden, Robert Coppin, Elizabeth Hopkins, Desire Minter, Priscilla Mullins, Elinor Billington, William Brewster, John Howland, and Fast Turtle (Wampanoag/Native).

There is also a “Featured Videos” bar with a sub-bar labeled Plimoth Plantation. Here you will find the following first person videos, each 1-2 minutes long:

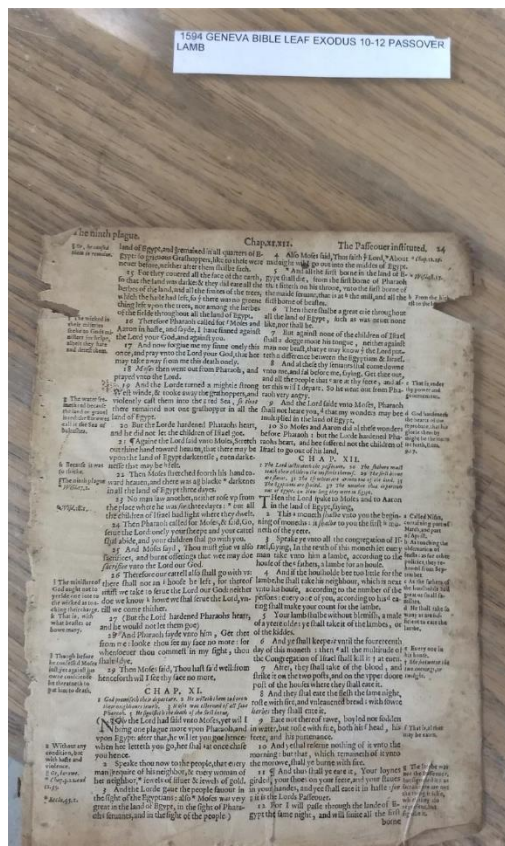
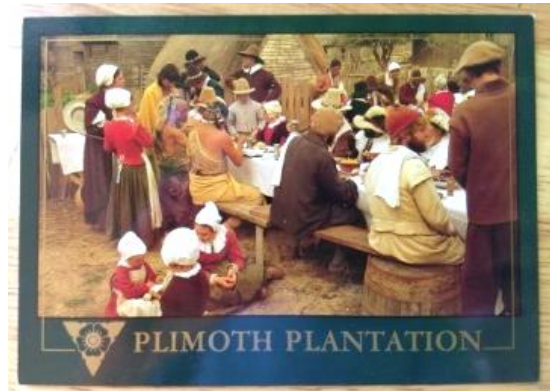
